

WHAT IS FENTANYL?

Fentanyl is a synthetic opioid that is 50-100 times stronger than morphine. Pharmaceutical fentanyl was developed for pain management treatment for people recovering from surgery or those with chronic conditions such as cancer. Because of its powerful heroin-like effects, fentanyl is also abused and sold on the street. Many users believe they are purchasing heroin or other drugs but are actually purchasing deadly fentanyl. Just two milligrams of fentanyl, which is equal to 10-15 grains of table salt and is considered a lethal dose.

Fentanyl is illegally manufactured

Fentanyl is often made into pills that have mostly been blue, imitating oxycodone. Fentanyl pills can be found in variety a of colors and look like candy, ex. Skittles. These colors can make the drug appear less dangerous to some users, but fentanyl is the deadliest drug circulating. A child can mistake pills for candy and not know how dangerous fentanyl can be and often results in death. Fentanyl can also be found in a powdery form like chalk and is often mixed into other drugs.

Q: Is Fentanyl dangerous

A: Fentanyl is the deadliest drug in the United States. More than 70,000 people die from fentanyl overdose.


